Just got off the phone with Jay Munro-- lead test guy for DOS comparative review. They are finalizing their testing of PC-DOS and MS-DOS today, but are still waiting on Novell. According to Jay, Novell is still promising final code by 12/1. He sounded skeptical that they would deliver on time. Jay thinks that they will know by middle of next week whether or not the review will slip-- currently it's slated for issue #5.

After multiple discussions with both Jay and Rick Ayre, PC Mag has decided to hold the networking discussion for the peer-to-peer comparative review-- now scheduled for issue #9. Jay said that there is a space limitation with the DOS comparative and they don't feel they can adequately discuss networking given the restrictions. They plan to mention that DR7 includes networking capabilities, but they will not do any performance testing of networking functionality. They will hold any mention of the workgroup connection for the ptp comparative.

This is a big win. PR has spent a significant amount of time over the last two months working with these guys to influence their treatment of networking in the DOS comparative. Without an in-depth discussion of networking features, DR7's perceived advantage over MS-DOS in the "bells and whistles" category is significantly reduced.
