As you may recall there were a number of problems raised by Marconi during their evaluation of DR DOS. Having proved ourselves responsive to technical problems and solved them, they have decided to standardize on DR DOS. This is helpfull for our associations with Opus, Amstrad and corporates.

Rowwer, just when we thought everything was OI they have come up with a new problem. They are having problems with their RAF astwork on the VAX.

They can sign on OX, it maps drives OX and they can access normal DOS commands from the Route directory. From within a sub-directory they can use 'dir' and 'CD', but any attempt to load programs within a sub-directory causes an 'Invalid Path' error.

Also a 'dir *.' within a sub-directory gives an endlassly repetitive list of sub-directories.

As they make extensive use of the RAY system this means that DR DOS is not viable. They are therefore, very worried/emberassed that having announced that they were standardizing on DR DOS that it has fallen over again. I understand from Mick Webb that from initial investigations that this is not a trivial problem.

I am very concerned we are about to lose a valuable corporate reference sits and that as this style of Network is often used in corporates that this could be a problem elsewhere.

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As the relevant people were not available last week I swait further input from the RDC. I would simply like to register at an early stage how important I think this matter is, and that I would vary much appreciate your involvement in scheduling any necessary work on this as a priority.

They have asked me to visit them tomorrow to discuss the position (I think they have also come up with another problem). Any commants of suggestions before tomorrows meeting (10-30) would be very welcome.

I suspect that a commitment to resolve the problem within a given number of weeks may be acceptable to them, but we certainly need to come up with schething.
